## Grant to Oceanside Conservation Trust Supports Island Groups

People who have battled bittersweet or knotweed, the island version of "bamboo," can appreciate a Peaks Island Fund grant that had school children removing these nuisance plants, yet more

learning about their impact on island ecosystems.

Oceanside Conservation Trust of Casco Bay received a Peaks Island Fund grant that brought together multiple groups and gave island youth a handson experience in dealing with invasive species and land stewardship.

The issue of invasive species goes deeper than merely battling bittersweet in the backyard. Invasive species can threaten an entire ecosystem because the plants don't serve as food for wildlife from the insects up. The plants also harbor ticks and reduce the diversity of native plants, which upsets the natural balance, said Jeanne Gulnick, Ph.D., a Peaks Island resident and an environmental sciences professor at St. Joseph's College in Standish. Gulnick wrote the grant, and said she believes the project was appropriate for the Oceanside Conservation Trust because a land

trust's job really begins after it has acquired the land.

Education about invasive species is a major component to addressing the problem, said Portland Arborist Jeff Tarling. Tarling said he is always looking for creative ways to deal with invasive species because people begin by trying to cut them down; however, they become overwhelmed and give up. When you can educate and provide a hands-on experience, the momentum continues.

At Peaks Island Elementary, the teachers incorporated invasive species into the curriculum to include basic scientific methods, computer mapping skills and island ecology. The students studied the plants and created brochures that Tarling said he will now hand out to the public. Tarling visited the island and conducted a field walk with the students, he said when he came back to the island the students

were experts on the plants and were seeing them everywhere.

Invasive species on the islands requires attention because the islands have many natural areas. If the invasive species are not controlled, they will destroy those areas. Tarling said that Peaks Island's Battery Steele is an "epicenter" of bittersweet, which was introduced during World War II. The knotweed probably came in from soil.

Teacher Cindy Nilsen said the effort represents service learning where students recognized a problem in a community, learned about all aspects of the problem and proposed solutions.

"We intend to continue our efforts to control the occurrence of invasive plant species on our campus and our island by seeking grant monies from outside sources and to maintain the involvement of all our students and their families throughout the school years," Nilsen said.

Collaboration was an integral part of the invasive species project. Jessica Burton, executive director of Southern Maine Conservation Collaborative and Peaks Island resident, coordinated the project and facilitated all of the groups working together.

"This was a small project, on a small island, with a small group of people, but the kids saw that the impact could be huge," Burton said.

The groups that collaborated on the invasive species project are the Peaks Island Elementary school, Oceanside Conservation Trust of Casco Bay, the City of Portland, the Island Institute's Fellow Maggie Small, Peaks Environmental Action Team, Peaks Island Academy and Maine Audubon.

#### 2013 GRANT AWARDS

#### Brackett Memorial United Methodist Church \$6.500

Friday Tween Nites provides a safe and caring place where youth who attend middle school can socialize, play games, watch movies and spend time with other youth, away from the

responsibilities that come with the transition into young adulthood. This program offers our island youth and friends from the city the opportunity to build confidence and healthy social skills at the same time providing

our greater community with the opportunity to be constructive guides and not only authoritarian figures.

Utilizing support from adult volunteers and program counselors, participants are encouraged to design, organize and host programs of interest to their peers. Tween Nite will continue to offer dinner, movies, and games as in previous years with two field trips each semester to offer a change of scenery and the opportunity to have fun and learn. The program will also offer short presentations from local experts on the island and include hands-on activities.

Four dormers are original to the Fifth Maine building, which dates to 1888, and have not been restored in any way, except for new roof shingles on a few occasions. Restoration of the dormers is the next

step in the museum's long-term building maintenance plan. Repairs to the dormers will help to maintain the structural integrity of the building, thus ensuring that the Hall will continue

to be available for community activities. It will also protect the local history exhibits in the upper level rooms from water damage.

#### Island Transportation System \$5,800

The Island Taxi continues to provide a vital transportation service for residents and guests on Peaks. ITS has been awarded funds for the maintenance and future cost of operation. In addition, support for the bookkeeping expenses and insurance for the vehicle has been provided for the next year.

#### Home Start \$3.000

Home Start continues to seek and provide affordable housing for Peaks Island residents. Both rental units and homes for sale have helped life long island residents remain on Peaks. To support that effort funds have been granted to help them with new program development and the ongoing maintenance and insurance expenses of their rental property.

## Casco Bay Health Center \$2,400

The island health center has begun a new partnership with Maine Medical Center in 2013. To support the needs of the facility, funds have been provided to acquire a portable vital sign cart and monitoring equipment that can be moved from one checkup room to another as needed. This acquisition will be owned by the Health Center.

#### Peaks Island Children's Workshop \$5,500

A new fence is needed to protect children playing out doors at the island early childhood education facility. Replacement costs have been provided to complete this project.

#### Peaks Island School \$12,345

The Peaks Island School has been awarded funds to update and revamp its science and environment curriculum to meet Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Utilizing the Island Fellow to help implement the new studies, the school will expand its program to include more experiential learning, field studies of osprey and ducks and field trips. This program puts the island school on the cutting edge of K-5 science curriculum in Maine and provides benefits to all six grade levels of the school.



#### **PROGRESS REPORTS FOR 2011 GRANTS**

#### Peaks Island Fund Grants at Work!

#### Children & Youth

**Brackett Memorial Church** utilized its grant of \$10,000 to continue programming for the Tween Nite program, with an average attendance of 16 youth per event. The grant also supported the AftaSchool drop-in program, which averaged between 6 and 10 students through the year.

**Peaks Island School** utilized a grant of \$7,070 to develop and implement Island Tales, which was a program where Peaks Island School students, in partnership with visiting artists and the Fifth Maine Regiment Museum, learned about island history through interviews with island elders.

### Affordable Housing and Quality Living

**Casco Bay Health Center** installed a digital scale and wall-mounted height measuring device with its grant of \$738, allowing for more accurate measurements that are crucial to evaluating patients' health status and clinical needs.

#### Fifth Maine Regiment Museum

utilized a \$2,500 grant toward its efforts to update the existing Coney Island of Maine exhibits, which is hoped to increase the understanding and appreciation of the role of tourism on Peaks Island. This work is continuing through the fall of 2013.

#### **The Peaks Environmental Action**

**Team** received \$2,000 which was used to develop a weatherization program, providing energy audits to approximately 100 island homes in collaboration with Efficiency Maine and the Island Fellow.

#### **Peaks Island Tax Assistance**

received \$300 which was utilized to support marketing of fund raising events and organizational filing requirements.

#### **Economic Opportunities**

#### **The Island Transportation System**

was awarded \$7,500 in matching funds to support the purchase of a new and more efficient taxi vehicle, which is in the process of being purchased.

#### The Peaks Island Children's

**Workshop** utilized its \$5,000 grant for staff development and programming to continue to build their expertise in teaching new strategies and concepts of early childhood education, both collaboratively with the Peaks Island School staff, as well as through Southern Maine Community College.



#### Sustainable Environment

#### **The Ocean Conservation Trust**

grant of \$7,200 was used to work collaboratively with students from the Peaks Island School to learn about invasive plant species that effect the island, including skills related to the island ecology, plant identification, basic scientific methods and computer mapping skills. A set of informative brochures about invasive species was developed by the children and published for distribution.

The Friends of Casco Bay received a grant of \$3,500 to support collaboration with PEAT and the youth from the Tween Program by labeling island storm drains and distributing educational materials about the importance of storm drain pollution prevention. Programming on BayScaping is scheduled to continue through the summer and into the fall of 2013.

#### Peaks Environmental Action Team Community Garden Project

was awarded \$500 to support the installation of a water-saving irrigation infrastructure, which is planned for implementation once the City of Portland has installed a water line to the area.


